Request for Public Comment – Proposal to amend 22 NYCRR § 36.2(d) relating

to compensation limits for Part 36 appointees

Date:

July 2, 2024

The Administrative Board of the Courts is seeking public comment on a proposal to increase, from \$100,000 to \$125,000, the annual compensation limit for persons appointed by judges pursuant to Part 36 of the Rules of the Chief Judge.

Attached as Exhibit A is a memorandum from the UCS Guardianship Advisory Committee, providing background on the proposed rule change. As noted in that memorandum, the current \$100,000 limit has not been increased since 2018, and Part 36 appointees awarded more than that amount in any calendar year are not eligible for new appointments under Part 36 for the following calendar year.

The specific change would be made to 22 NYCRR § 36.2(d), which would be amended to read as follows:

- "(d) Limitations on appointments based upon compensation.
- (1) No person shall be eligible to receive more than one appointment within a calendar year for which the compensation anticipated to be awarded to the appointee in any calendar year exceeds the sum of \$15,000.
- (2) If a person has been awarded more than an aggregate of \$100,000 \$125,000 in compensation by all courts during any calendar year, the person shall not be eligible for compensated appointments by any court during the next calendar year.
- (3) For purposes of this Part, the term compensation shall mean awards by a court of fees, commissions, allowances or other compensation, excluding costs and disbursements.

(4) These limitations shall not apply where the appointment is necessary to maintain continuity of representation of or service to the same person or entity in further or subsequent proceedings."

Applicability of Compensation Limitation in Part 36.2 (d) (2) to Court

Examiners

This memorandum is submitted in response to the request from the Administrative Board of the Courts for a recommendation from the Guardianship Advisory Committee (GAC) as to whether the compensation limitation set forth in Part 36 of the Rules of the Chief Judge (22 NYCRR [Part] 36) should be either (1) increased or (2) contain an exemption for court examiners. This topic was discussed at the GAC meeting on May 8, 2024 and our recommendation is based on broad consensus of our committee.

The GAC recommends that the compensation limitation set forth in Part 36.2 (d) (2) be increased from \$100,000 to \$125,000.

Court examiners are fiduciary appointees subject to the reporting requirements and disqualifying factors and limitations of Part 36. Part 36.2 (d) (2) limits appointments based upon compensation awarded for Part 36 appointments as follows:

If a person has been awarded more than an aggregate of \$100,000 in compensation by all courts during any calendar year, the person shall not be eligible for compensated appointments by any court during the next calendar year."

This "cap" on compensation has been increased only twice in over the last 20 years. On November 15, 2002, the cap was set at \$50,000. On February 4, 2008, this sum was raised to \$75,000. About a decade later, on October 18, 2018, the sum was raised to \$100,000.

In some areas of the state, particularly the large downstate counties, a significant number of experienced and capable court examiners have been rendered ineligible to serve due to awards that exceed the Part 36.2 (d) (2) "cap". The First Department reported that one-half of the court examiners on their list are ineligible to serve as court examiners in 2024 because they have "capped" out.

A decrease in Part 36 list court examiners results in a higher caseload for those remaining on the list and compounds the problem. Higher caseloads also mean court examiners have less time to devote to necessary compliance efforts.

As a temporary solution, the GAC previously recommended a two year "moratorium" on Court Examiner fees being included in the Part 36 cap. After further review, the GAC recommends that the cap be raised from \$100,000 to \$125,000 and that Part 36.2 (d) (2) of the Rules of the Chief Judge be amended as follows:

- (d) Limitations on appointments based upon compensation
 - (2) If a person or entity has been awarded more than an aggregate of [\$100,000] \$125,000 in compensation by all courts during any calendar year, the person or entity shall not be eligible for compensated appointments by any court during the next calendar year.

The GAC recommends the sum of \$125,000 based upon the annual average rate of inflation utilizing the consumer price index rates published by the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (a copy of a table showing the Consumer Price Index U. S. City Average is annexed). The current rate of inflation is 3.4 percent based upon the consumer price index for May 2024. The U. S. Congressional Budget Office predicts that inflation will be 2.2 percent in 2025, 2.1 percent in 2026 and level to 2 percent a year to 2034 (see

The Budget Economic Outlook: 2024 to 2034, dated February 2024, page 43, www.cbo.gov/system/files/2024-02/59710-Outlook-2024.pdf). The GAC further recommends that this cap on compensation be periodically reviewed and increased commensurate with inflation.
