

**SPORTS BRIBE RECEIVING**  
**(E Felony)**  
**(Sports Official)**  
**Penal Law 180.45(2)**  
**(Committed on or after Aug. 27, 1982)**

The \_\_\_\_\_ count is Sports Bribe Receiving.

Under our law a person is guilty of Sports Bribe Receiving when, being a sports official, he or she solicits, accepts or agrees to accept any benefit from another person upon an agreement or understanding that such sports official will perform his or her duties improperly.

Some of the terms used in this definition have their own special meaning in our law. I will now give you the meaning of the following terms: "sports official," "benefit," "agreement," and "understanding."

**SPORTS OFFICIAL** means any person who participates or expects to participate in a sports contest as an umpire, referee, judge or otherwise to officiate at a sports contest.<sup>1</sup> Sports contest means any professional or amateur sport or athletic game or contest viewed by the public.<sup>2</sup>

**BENEFIT** means any gain or advantage to the beneficiary and includes any gain or advantage to a third person pursuant to the desire or consent of the beneficiary.<sup>3</sup>

**AGREEMENT** means mutual agreement between a sports official and a person from whom he or she solicits, accepts or agrees to accept any benefit, that such sports official will perform

his or her duties improperly.<sup>4</sup>

UNDERSTANDING means at least a unilateral perception or belief by a sports official who solicits, accepts or agrees to accept any benefit from another person, that such benefit will influence the sports official to perform his or her duties improperly.<sup>5</sup>

In order for you to find the defendant guilty of this crime, the People are required to prove, from all the evidence in the case, beyond a reasonable doubt, each of the following three elements:

1. That on or about (date), the defendant (defendant's name), was a sports official;
2. That on or about that date, in the county of (county), the defendant solicited, accepted or agreed to accept a benefit from (specify); and
3. That the defendant did so upon an agreement or understanding that he/she would perform his/her duties improperly.

Therefore, if you find that the People have proven beyond a reasonable doubt each of those elements, you must find the defendant guilty of the crime of Sports Bribe Receiving as charged in the \_\_\_\_\_ count.

On the other hand, if you find that the People have not proven beyond a reasonable doubt any one or more of those elements, you must find the defendant not guilty of the crime of
